1. Update on Community Justice Center Initiatives

Limited update, as Dane County had to step out of grant competition because agencies did not have the capacity to operate in the time frame required due to COVID. Discussion of needs assessment funding allocated by Board of Supervisors. Additional conversation needs to occur by the full body of the Criminal Justice Council, rather than its subcommittees, regarding Resolution 145 and the potential halting of the jail consolidation project. This subcommittee requests that the CJC place Resolution 145 and the jail consolidation project on their agenda for discussion.

CRC moved to a new space directly before the COVID pandemic. Program was moved to remote, using Zoom for restorative justice circles. Remote work is going smoothly, as the participating 17-25 year-olds are comfortable with the technology. Plans to hire new staff member have been paused due to hiring freeze. CRC is using creative alternatives to in-person community service requirements. There is still approximately the same number of new participants entering services, even during COVID. CRC is also tracking data at an increased capacity through a partnership with OpenLattice. MOU was passed by McFarland. Discussion regarding municipalities that still need to pass the MOU to refer to CRC. Subcommittee asked for an updated list from CRC.

4. Agency Responses to COVID-19 [Each CJC-RD member give a 5 minute report]

Sheriff's Office: Presented by MacKinnon, using presentation and notes provided by Triggs

Review of slideshow provided by Lt. Triggs of Dane County Sherriff's Office. 3-phased approach to respond to COVID-19 and reduce its spread. Approach includes continuity of operations plan, input by public health and medical providers, partnerships with external agencies to reduce new admissions to the jail, and reduction of vulnerable populations. Reduction of the jail population was only possible because of a collaboration between criminal justice agencies across Dane County.

Judicial: Presented by Reynolds

Courts extended the reporting date for individuals who must go to jail such that they do not enter during peak of COVID-19 pandemic. Sentencing was also delayed. Courts implemented relief from warrants related to low-level offenses. Resuming court may lead to an increase in jail population since some individuals were just delayed from entering due to the pandemic. The court is currently working on a reopening plan with physicallydistanced jury trials.

Juvenile Detention—Presented by Bauman

Discussion of presentation. Emphasis on decrease in new intake by making a policy not to take in juveniles who are not at significant community protection risks.

Community Restorative Court: Presented by Marino Slideshow attached

Community Restorative Court update (previous Report to Committee) covered much of this material. Discussion of remote training. Discussion of need for increased staff in order to expand caseload.

District Attorney: Presented by Ozanne

District Attorney's Office moved the majority of operations to remote work, but some employees have to go into the office for discovery. Restarting in-person court will have a large impact on operations and potentially on decarceration, since there are questions about whether the jail population remains low due to lack of bench warrants for non-appearance. Marcy's Law is also leading to a readjustment of resources in order to remain in compliance by alerting victims to initial appearance and bail hearings of offenders. This also leads to increased redaction between district attorneys and defense attorneys to preserve increased privacy for victims.

MPD: Presented by Tye

MPD consulted with doctor/public health professional about strategies to respond to COVID pandemic and protect officers and the public from spreading the virus. MPD utilized additional protective equipment and implemented decontamination protocols, in-house contact tracing, and quarantine periods. Back-end staff work remotely, although patrol officers must continue to work in person.
